

3rd grade STA Reading: April 15-17, 2020

Hi 3rd grade STA students! I miss you and I pray for you! Remember to read every day!

Last week we started our unit on Folktales. Do you remember some of the traits of folktales?

Folktales: ...have been told again and again for many generations
...told for entertainment and to teach younger generations

We also read many fables. What are the characteristics of fables? (See bottom of page for answer.)

This week we will read **fairy tales**. Fairy tales contain fantasy (make-believe), magic, and clearly defined good characters and evil characters.

Examples of fairy tales include Little Red Riding Hood, Sleeping Beauty, Snow White, Hansel and Gretel,... As you read fairy tales, try to identify the good characters, the evil characters, and the magic.

We can summarize fairy tales using the “Somebody, wanted, but, so, then” method.

Hansel and Gretel wanted to find their way back to their house, so they dropped bread crumbs on the path, **but** birds ate the crumbs. **So** Hansel and Gretel knocked on the door of a gingerbread house and a witch welcomed them in. **Then** the witch tried to eat the kids, but they pushed her into the oven.
